

Carey Robinson

Carey is Head of Learning & Participation at the Fitzwilliam Museum and was previously Head of Education at the South London Gallery. She is also a trustee at A New Direction, an organisation generating opportunities for young people in London, and Create London, who work with local communities to commission art and architecture.

Carey joined the panel as the Covid-19 pandemic's disproportionate effect on black and minority ethnic communities has highlighted inequalities in healthcare outcomes. She says: "This is a vital opportunity to collectively explore the potential of participatory grant-making in Southwark - centring communities, shifting power and resources, and trying to improve grant-making processes and strategies."

Zaida works with Organisation Dominicanos en Acción which promotes Dominican culture and values whilst learning from other cultures. A graduate from South Bank University, Zaida is a trained educator working with local schools and community centres, and has been a governor of her local secondary school for 12 years.

Zaida joined the panel to contribute to reducing health inequalities, after finding how Covid-19 had affected some communities and the difficulties experienced by the Latin American community in accessing services. Being part of the ongoing learning from the codesign process has real significance



for Zaida. She says: “Family, learning and community inspire and motivate me. They are the centre of everything.”

Nuala Riddell-Morales

Nuala moved to Venezuela after completing her studies at Cardiff University to set up an English language teaching business. Returning to London she worked in fundraising and project management in the emerging London Latin American community. She is a founder of the Latin American School and Carnaval del Pueblo, who produce the entry for the London New Years Day parade.

Nuala joined the panel to help breakdown barriers that can contribute to poorer health and wellbeing in BAME communities in Southwark. A member of the Latin American network she brings her experience and skills to this complex project.

Romina has a wide range of experience in government and the third sector. She started her career working for intergovernmental organisations such as the EU Parliament and the Organisation of American States.
